Puerto Rican/Jamaican-descendant singer Huey Dunbar was discovered by tropical music arranger/producer Sergio George after performing in a talent contest.

During the following two years, the young artist honed his skills as he learned how to speak and sing in Spanish. Dunbar debuted as a backup singer for Yolanda Monge, participating in India's 1994 *Dicen Que Soy* album, and singing along with Víctor Manuelle. In 1996, he joined tropical-club/dance act DLG (Dark Latin Groove), performing alongside James de Jesús and Wilfredo Crispin, also known as Fragancia, climbing to the top of the Latin charts with a song called "No Morirá." After issuing "Swing On" and the Grammy nominated "Gotcha," Huey's solo debut, *Yo Si Me Enamoré*, was released in 2001, followed by his sophomore effort *Music for My Peoples*, in '03. Fast-forward, after a seven-year hiatus, and a new record deal, Dunbar is back with his self-titled third studio album *Huey Dunbar IV*, which debuted at No. 2 on Latin Billboard Charts.-
